This was done to comply with provincial legislation, and it took a huge amount of time and effort.

Special thanks to past Commodore Becky Middlebrook who has put in an unbelievable amount of time and effort to get this all in place. Special thanks to Paul Middlebrook who was the chair of the By-law Committee, and the members, all of whom met regularly over the last two years.

Numerous information sessions and discussions paved the way for the unanimous approval of the new GYC documents.

The extensive new Policies and Procedures were developed and written by all the Directors on the outgoing board. Doug Edgar, Suza Sarnecki, Trevor Stokes and Becky Middlebrook worked on formatting and archiving them, after John Gilbert had proofread them from a legal perspective.

### Gas Dock & Safety

I am pleased to inform you that our Gas Dock opened for the season on Saturday, May 11th.

Hours: Sat: 8:00 am- 12:00pm Wed: 4:00 pm - 8:00pm Fri: 4:00pm - 8:00pm.

Charles Edgar is back as our knowledgeable attendant. Please remember to specify gas or diesel on arrival and Charlie will likely ask once again as a verification, so please don't be surprised. Captains, please have an idea of how much fuel you will want/need, this will assist Charlie in his work.

As in the past, payment for fuel will be by cheque or etransfer.

Access Cards and burgees are for sale as well. These can be cash or e-transfer as well but will be a separate transaction.

The Pump-out is ready now. Please remember to flush the line after use and to shut off the pump.

Finally, for the fuel pump, please do not use the Emergency Stop button unless it is a true emergency! Power to the pump battery is affected, you may hear a low hum with the gas dock closed, however this is normal.

### **Planning Committee**

I sure hope you are having a great start to the 2024 boating season!!!

My name is Jason Lehtovaara and I live here in Owen Sound with my wife Sarah, daughter Siobhan and our dog Bruno. We also have a son Ira living in Tiverton who frequently visits our boat Jigs & Reels in the West Basin.

I am pleased to be your Planning Committee Director for preparing club projects and outlining our strategic planning at GYC.

As you know our club has recently prepared several policies and procedures that define how we operate as a club. The planning Committee is no exception and we now have a detailed procedure for planning and approving various projects for GYC. We are typically the first committee to review a project in detail and are responsible for presenting it to the Board of Directors for approval, schedule and budget forecast.

Recently many of you completed a survey related to a self-assessment of your dock and I want to share the results with you:

• 90 members completed the survey (82 electronically and 8 paper submissions) WOW!

• When members graded the condition of their dock the ratings ranged from 3.1 to 3.8 out of 5 (this is marginal or acceptable – indicates we can improve conditions)

• 56 members have made some sort of improvement or modification to their own dock to improve substandard conditions

• 26 members have stated that they are dissatisfied with their docks, some specifics stand out from multiple members

• 9 members acknowledge that the dock has reached the end of life

• 2 members offered modifications to make their dock safer

• 5 members have significant concerns with stability of their floating docks

• 10 members are supportive of future needs and considerations being incorporated into design of the basins. Our future "footprint" will be different than what we have today.

From the results of this simple survey, it is clear that many members are dissatisfied with the docks at GYC and want to take steps to improve the condition and incorporate future needs of the club in the solution. The club want a call to action to develop the strategy which is a top priority for the Planning Committee.

Looking forward to working with all of you.

### Webmaster – Member Tips

#### Adding Spouses to Committees and Email Notifications:

If your spouse wants to serve on a committee and wants to receive email from the committee's director or chairperson, you can enter their email address in your profile's "Spouse Email" field. Then ask Membership or Webmaster to add them to the committee. They will then receive emails from the committee's director or chairperson. Everyone is in the To: field. You can reply all and see others' replies. This is not new. It's been around since last year. But it doesn't mean that the spouse received the emails that communications sent.

But now, independent of the above, it's possible for a member to subscribe their spouse or partner to the club's general email list. To do this, the logged in member just has to navigate to Members > My GYC > MY PROFILE. At the bottom, after all the familiar stuff about your contact information, your boat, and the list of committees you server on, you'll find a form to subscribe your spouse. Simply enter their email address and hit subscribe. They will receive an email with a confirmation link. Your spouse will learn about all the happenings in the club without relying on you, the member, telling them.

Oh - while you are there, viewing your profile, check if everything is correct. Some you can change yourself. For boat and committee changes, please contact mooring or membership.

On the subject of committees, and who serves on which: It's always been possible for a member to view their own profile to see which committees they serve on. And you can click on any committee and see the list of members on that committee. But there was no easy way to see all of the committees a given member served on. Now that information has been added to the member detail. That's the pop-up that appears when you click on any member's name.

If you look at your own profile and see a message in red saying you don't serve on any committees, contact Membership or the Webmaster to get that corrected. We all checked a number of committees when we joined the club.


- 2. Look for the + sign on the top menu bar

### **Treasurers Report**

The 2023 financial report from King and Associates as well as the 2024 budget have been posted on the website. Please take some time to review both these documents as this reflects the working of the club for last year and moving forward for this year.

The board continues to put resources toward improving and maintaining the club and services to members. There has a been great deal of work done around the club, and we are always reviewing improvements and maintenance requirements to respond to member's needs.

With the spring launch just around the corner I would like to remind members if you are planning any future changes to your launch, haul or storage, this should be communicated to Brian MacIntosh at invoicing@georgianyachtclub.com. Brian spends a great deal of time keeping our data base up to date. The more that members can help with this process the easier it is for everyone.

Another reminder about fuel purchases. The same as last year, payment for fuel purchases can be made by cheque payable to the GYC or e-transfer to treasurer@georgianyachtclub.com.

If you are also purchasing a \$5-dollar key card or \$25dollar burgee, please do not combine multiple purchases into one cheque or e-transfer as each is accounted separately (e.g., purchasing a key card and fuel). You can also pay cash for the key cards and burgees.



The treasure committee has been busy over the last several months. Our work has included an update to the policies and procedures of the club to align with our new by laws as well as a new billing process for mooring. Although the mooring formula of length plus width has served us well, we had many discussions about moving to a system that would make mooring more equitable within the club. We will be moving to a length time width system for the 2025 mooring fees.

As an example of 3 boats in the club:

Boat A. 41 feet long by 15 feet wide. With our current mooring formula length plus width is 56 times our current schedule C mooring rate of 5 dollars = 280 dollars. Under our new formula of square feet, 41 times 15 is 615 times a suggested rate of 56 cents = 344.40 dollars.

Boat B. 34 feet long by 12 feet wide. With our current mooring formula length plus width is 46 times our current schedule C mooring rate of 5 dollars = \$230. Under our new formula of square feet, 34 time 12 is 408 times a suggested rate of 56 cents =228.48 dollars.

Boat C. 24 feet long by 7 feet wide. With our current mooring formula length plus with is 31 times our current schedule C mooring rate of 5 dollars = times 5 = \$155 dollars. Under our new formula of square feet 24 times 7 is 168 times a suggested rate of 56 cents 94.08 dollars.

This funding formula is designed to make mooring income to the GYC neutral in total dollars to the club, but members with larger boats will be paying a larger portion of the mooring cost and members with smaller boats will see a reduction. Total income to the club in the above example is 665 dollars under the old formula and 667 with the new.

#### Join us on June 15, 2024 - GYC Sailpast

The Sailpast tradition began at the first Yacht Club that was formed at Cowes in England nearly 200 years ago. The membership at Cowes was primarily aristocratic and many were familiar with naval practice and tradition. Cowes Yacht Club subsequently changed its name to the Royal Yacht Squadron and certain social graces were added to the traditional naval practices.

The actual "review of the fleet" is steeped in more than 600 years of Royal Navy tradition and history and was introduced in Yacht clubs as a continuation of the naval habit of having Admirals (and/or Royalty) review the fleet on special occasions.

Protocol demanded that a flagship be anchored with the Admiral and staff on the quarterdeck to receive and return the salute. Vessels sailed past, dipping their colours in salute, and with their captain also saluting with the ship's company standing at attention. The Vice Admiral would lead the fleet passing in review and the final vessel in the line would carry the Rear Admiral.

Our Yacht Club tradition is almost identical, except that the salute is received by the Commodore instead of the Admiral and the salute is delivered by the passing boat, if under sail, by luffing its jib, or, if under power, by dipping its ensign. All of the crew on the saluting boat stands at attention facing the Commodore, who is the only one to salute by hand. If there is insufficient wind, sailboats should have their engines on.

Protocol dictates that until the Sailpast is completed, only the flagship may be dressed (strung with bunting and flags). However, after the Sailpast, participating yachts are encouraged to dress on returning to their dock.

By precedent, Sailpast is a formal event that officially opens the boating season. The Navy and many yacht clubs also follow the Sailpast with a "Blessing of the Fleet", a long-standing European tradition, first practiced in Portugal, of seeking divine providence to those who labored or ventured on the sea to assure good harvest, safe passage and safe return. At IYC the Sailpast is accompanied by dressing the clubhouse and flagpole and a formal raising of the national flag, accompanied by a cannon salute. The ceremony is followed by a reception on the lawn.

Like most boating activities, Sailpast is somewhat weather dependent. We all hope for a bright sunny day, calm seas and just enough wind to propel the boats around the course in an orderly fashion. But Mother Nature does not always cooperate. In that case a sailor's ingenuity comes into play. Tradition dictates that all club members

participate in the Sailpast, on their own or on another member's yacht. Good manners require that a member unable to participate will send his/her regrets to the Commodore

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### Boaters: Recognize Symptoms of a Concussion

Almost every boater has had their 'bell rung' by the boom or other boating equipment. This hazard puts boaters at risk of concussions. Every boater should know what the symptoms of a concussion look like.

A person with a concussion might have any of the signs or symptoms listed below. They might show up right away or hours, or even days later. Just one sign or symptom is enough to suspect a concussion. Most people with a concussion **do not** lose consciousness.

#### Common signs and symptoms

#### Physical

- Headache
- Pressure in the head
- Dizziness
- Nausea or vomiting
- Blurred vision
- Sensitivity to light or sound
- Ringing in the ears
- Balance problems
- Tired or low energy
- Drowsiness
- "Don't feel right"

#### **Sleep-related**

- Sleeping more or less than usual
- Having a hard time falling asleep

### Cognitive (Thinking)

- Not thinking clearly
- Slower thinking
- Feeling confused
- Problems concentrating
- Problems remembering

#### Emotional

- Irritability (easily upset or angered)
- Depression



"Red flags" may mean the person has a more serious injury. Treat red flags as an emergency and call 911.

#### Red flags include:

- Neck pain or tenderness
- Double vision
- Weakness or tingling in arms or legs
- Severe or increasing headache
- Seizure or convulsion
- Loss of consciousness (knocked out)
- Vomiting more than once
- Increasingly restless, agitated or aggressive

#### What to do if you suspect a concussion

Follow these three steps if you — or someone you know — experiences a blow to the head, face, neck or body and you suspect a concussion. Call 911 if you are concerned the injury is life-threatening, such as the person is unconscious or they had a seizure.

- 1. Recognize signs and symptoms of a concussion and remove yourself or the athlete from the sport/physical activity, even if you feel OK or they insist they are OK.
- 2. Get yourself or the athlete checked out by a physician or nurse practitioner.
- 3. Support gradual return to school and sport.
